American Literature ESL 4 (Grades 10-12)

Course Description:

AMERICAN LITERATURE ESL 4 (Grades 10-12) Full Year 101950 6 Blocks 1 English Credit

Prerequisites: At least three years of English and teacher recommendation. NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) approved course

In this college preparatory course for English language learners, the student will develop advanced academic skills in reading and writing. The emphasis is on the critical analysis and interpretation of various American authors of the 19th and 20th centuries. The course will also include an intensive review of English grammar, vocabulary development and essay writing. Particular focus will be given to response to literature in the form of essays and journal entries, personal essay writing reflecting college application requirements as well as use of source materials and their applications across disciplines. Students may be enrolled in American History ESL (Grades 10-12) which includes Seminar Skills.
