Personalized learning is achieved through standards-based, rigorous and relevant curriculum that is aligned to digital tools and resources.

Course Description: (from COSG)

This course continues the study of Mandarin with emphasis on development of free expression in the skill areas of speaking and writing as students move up to intermediate proficiency. Students will review and expand the grammar and vocabulary of the previous levels of study. Reading includes authentic short stories, notes, messages, and newspaper and magazine articles. Cultural awareness is reinforced by the use of Chinese movies, theater, music and poetry, with an emphasis placed on the reading, viewing and appreciation of age appropriate and relevant authentic works. A deeper understanding and appreciation of Chinese culture will be emphasized. The curriculum is focused on listening, speaking, reading and writing and the novice/intermediate ACTFL proficiency level.

Enduring Understandings

- Traditionally, Chinese people live with not only their parents, but often with their grandparents and other extended family as well. In ancient China, many generations of a single family would live together.
- Understand China's notoriously rigorous education system. In fact, Chinese education has been rigorous for centuries.
- Dr. Sun Yat-sen (⊠中山: Sūn Zhōngshān)—considered by many to be the father of modern China—spent much of his youth studying abroad.

- Professions in ancient China were divided into four categories: the scholar-gentry class (±: shì), the agricultural class (☒: nóng), the artisan class (☒: gōng), and the merchant class (茵: shāng).
- Since ancient times, Chinese people have enjoyed playing tile and board games for fun and for mental stimulation.
- A Chinese park is a sight to behold with people of all ages making use of the facilities.
- Today, as in the past, small statues of household deities and good luck totems
 may be found on display around a home. Three of the most popular statuettes for
 the home are those that represent the three lucky gods: Fu (福: Fú: "good
 fortune"), Lu (禄: Lù: "prosperity"), and Shou (寿: Shòu; "longevity")
- The Campuses of Peking and Tsinghua universities, two of China's most prestigious institutions of higher education, are excellent examples of blending the old with the new.
- One of Beijing's most distinctive features is its many hutongs (胡同: hútòng) —
 narrow alleyways around which people live in siheyuan (四合院: sìhéyuàn), oldfashioned courtyard houses.
- Chinese people like to invite people to a local's house, and it always helps to know some of the etiquette surrounding interacting with a Chinese family.
- Chinese cinema is becoming more and more well-known internationally, and has its own unique style and culture. One of the first things people think of when they think of Chinese cinema is kung fu movies.
- There is a certain etiquette one follows when eating at a restaurant or at someone's house in China.

- u. Describe relative positions of different facilities and buildings
- v. Use appropriate expressions for telephone conversations
- w. Invite people to gatherings and provide party information
- x. Describe a series of events or activities in chronological order
- y. Name different movie genres
- z. Talk about a movie's showtimes, plot, and reviews
- aa. Discuss and express opinions on different types of movies
- bb. Order food and drinks at a Chinese restaurant
- cc. Describe different flavors
- dd. Inquire about and provide suggestions for dishes
- 3. Role play situations involving:
 - a. Conversation about summer activities
 - b. A role play about changing schedule in the counselor's office
 - c. Asking each other's parents' professions
 - d. Discussing interests
 - e. Report of the sports meet
 - f. Show your room to the best friend
 - g. A campus tour
 - h. A community event
 - i. Make an invitation card for someone's birthday
 - i. Writing comments about a new movie
 - k. Phone calls about dining out
